FAIRY MARTIN

Scientific Name: *Petrochelidon ariel* Atlas Number: 360

DESCRIPTION:

The Fairy Martin is a small bird, with dark wings, a white underbody and a pinkish-red head. The short, slightly forked tail appears square in flight. It is gregarious, feeding in large flocks and nesting in



colonies.

SIMILAR SPECIES:

The related Tree Martin, *H. nigricans*, has a black head and a 'dirty' white rump. Martins are generally smaller and 'dumpier' than swallows, and have a shorter, squared rather than forked tail in flight.

DISTRIBUTION:

The Fairy Martin is found across Australia.

HABITAT:

The Fairy Martin prefers open country near water, and is usually seen near its nest sites, in cliffs, culverts or bridges.

SEASONAL MOVEMENTS:

Seasonally migratory, moving north for winter, with some birds flying to New Guinea.

FEEDING:

The Fairy Martin feeds high in the air on flying insects, usually in large flocks.

BREEDING:

A colonial nester, the Fairy Martin builds bottleshaped mudnests that are packed closely together on the ceilings of caves, and under bridges or other similar structures. Both sexes build the nest and share incubation and care of the young.

LIVING WITH US

The Fairy Martin readily uses artificial structures such as bridges to attach its nests to, and will also use inhabited buildings to make its nests on.

There were large numbers of small birds darting in and out of the bushes beside the creek, including a surprise sighting of two Australian Ringnecks by Ross and Pam. The rest of us managed to catch a glimpse of one of them in a distant silky oak. There were several ducks in the creek, including some dubious

mallard crosses, and a Darter and a Striated Heron beyond the bridge.

After spotting 50 species in the park, we went off to Passionate Palate. After enjoying coffee and delicious cakes, we walked round the lake. As well as the resident pair of Magpie Geese, there were a large number of Royal Spoonbills, and in the reedbeds, to everyone's delight we got excellent view of three Ballion's Crakes, as well as Australian Reed Warblers, and the mournful call of a Little Grassbird.

WEEKEND WALK

Saturday 14th October 2023

WOLLONGONG BOTANIC GARDENS WALK

Early voting done for the doomed Referendum we met 14 members at the western gate to the Botanic Gardens off Murphys Avenue. Before we even got through the gate, we had a good sighting of a Topknot Pigeon and also some Musk Lorikeets possibly nesting in the nearby gums. Then we made our way through the Woodland Garden into the Rainforest Collection. A large male Brush Turkey came over to greet us no doubt hoping for some tidbits. We were trying to track down the call of a Black-faced Monarch but it gave us only a brief glimpse. However, the Eastern Yellow Robins were very friendly popping down onto the pathway for a

good sighting. Made our way towards the verandah of the Towri Centre for morning tea seeing Rainbow and Musk Lorikeets feeding on the Grass Tree flower spikes. Crimson Rosellas and King Parrots were also feeding here in shrubs and Figbirds were heard and seen as the figs were fruiting. The spring flowers in the gardens were lovely as we wandered down toward the pond.

A Satin Bowerbirds bower was found on the way. The pond was busy as there was several families feeding the Coots, Ducks and Moorhens. A family of Wood Ducks with 16 ducklings gave some delight on our return to the picnic tables for lunch while a hopeful Silver Gull and Crested Pigeons joined us.



The Future of IBOC

Some thoughts to consider

After an approach by some IBOC members last year following our AGM, Andrew Knowlson (Secretary) spoke to members about a possible approach to Illawarra Birders (IB) with a view to merge. At that time there was no objection to an approach being made to Illawarra Birders to gauge their thoughts on the matter.

Andrew informally raised the matter with Ralph Stadus, IB President. This resulted in a comprehensive response from IB which is included in this newsletter for your consideration.

As a group, the members of IBOC are aging and less able to engage in activities once enjoyed. As a consequence, we do not have renewal through younger members joining and stepping up to take on the responsibilities of office bearers and committee members etc. We must consider that in the near future IBOC will no longer be able to function and may cease to operate.

The meeting, walks and camps program for 2024 will be decided by the new committee. Not all current committee members will be seeking re-election. It is obvious, however, that a smaller committee will most likely present a shorter program. The program should be tuned to better meet the needs of members. After many years of adhering to the format of hall meetings, mid-week and weekend walks with Spring and Autumn Camps some change is needed. Your current Committee has discussed the possibility of daytime meetings either at the hall or at a location like Integral Energy Park or a combination of the two, eliminating weekend walks and having a second mid-week walk at a fixed location like Integral Energy Park.

At our AGM in November members will be asked to share their views so the incoming Committee has guidance from members on how to proceed. Those members unable to attend may submit their thoughts in writing.

The choices your Committee currently would like members to consider are:-

- 1) Accept the offer of IB for a period of membership and join in their program and keep IBOC on a reduced program.
- 2) Accept the offer of IB and proceed to cancel our registration as an incorporated association.
- 3) Refuse the offer of IB and run a reduced program.
- 4) Refuse the offer of IB and proceed to cancel our registration as an incorporated association.

If we were to decide to cancel our registration a special general meeting would need to be held and all members would have a vote on any proposal.

Illawarra Birders position in relation to IBOC. May 2023

Here are some positional statements which should be useful for IBOC in understanding Illawarra Birders current thinking following your approach regarding a possible joining of the clubs.

- Illawarra Birders believes a single strong active club in the Illawarra would be advantageous for the education about, and conservation of birds.
- Illawarra Birders aim is to inspire the enjoyment, education, research
 and conservation of birds. Our mission is to build and encourage
 cooperation and partnerships between birding clubs and all levels of
 Government to ensure the conservation of bird species and their
 habitat.
- 3. We are active and affiliated with Birdlife Australia.
- Our extensive program of events and camps is constantly evolving to meet the needs of members. More socially focused activity can be accommodated in our program without distracting from our core mission above.
- 5. We welcome existing members of IBOC to Illawarra Birders meetings or events.
- 6. We would extend free membership for the first year to IBOC members should they wish to join Illawarra Birders.
- 7. We will retain the name Illawarra Birders and our existing operational methods.
- We are always looking for people to deploy their skills in the operation of the club, either on the committee or as a coordinator of specific activities.
- 9. In the event IBOC decided to close; wind up matters including any funds you hold would be a matter solely for IBOC to consider.

ALTERNATIVE OPTION

As all members know by now, IBOC is in danger of disbanding. The future of this wonderful club will be discussed at the November AGM.

After presenting an idea to the committee, at their request I have prepared a proposal that can be put to members and discussed on the night of the AGM..

Currently, IBOC faces several major obstacles to continuing: Dwindling and aging membership, not enough members to serve on the committee and fill other positions, and lack of speakers.

I believe all these can be overcome by broadening the scope of the club from only involving birds to encompassing other fields of natural history.

Under the auspices of the Jamberoo CWA, Daphne and I have been presenting a series of Nature and Environment Talks for almost two years.

We have featured speakers as diverse as IBOC's Bill Zeely on "Our place in the universe" to Lyndal Dawson on "Megafauna of Australia" and Peter Fackender on nesting birds.

Speakers have also covered, among others: ants and termites, monsters and marvels of the backyard garden, bioluminescence, lyrebirds, trees of the Illawarra, tornados, protecting local endangered wildlife ... even starting and running Western Plains Zoo!

Jamberoo has only about 1500 residents yet these talks **attract audiences of between 35 and 75 who each pay \$5 to attend**. And that when the only publicity for the talks is through a local Facebook site and with a few posters.

Now imagine offering something similar under the auspices of IBOC with all of Wollongong and surrounding areas to draw attendance from. The scope is enormous and could lead to a substantial increase in membership, particularly of younger people. This in turn will provide members to fill positions on the committee and in other roles.

I personally can connect with speakers to keep us busy for the next few years with monthly talks that will appeal to a much larger audience than talks only on birds will do.

That is not to say birds will be neglected, but by diversifying to include other aspects of nature we will have much more to offer prospective members. Walks and camps can continue but can also be diversified to take in more than just birds. Again, that should boost attendance at these events.

By calling and publicising this as the "IBOC Nature Group" there will be no need to change the name or constitution. But a group by that name in our publicity will appeal to a much wider audience than just IBOC.
